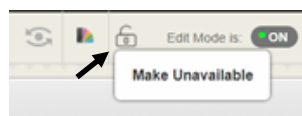
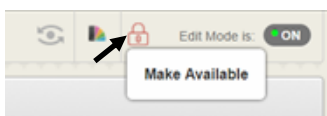

3 Tips for Writing Multiple Choice Test Questions

1. Avoid negatively phrased questions. This makes the question unnecessarily difficult, testing students' ability to understand the question instead of focusing on the correct answer.
2. Eliminate excessive wording and irrelevant information in the stem.
3. The stem should be meaningful by itself and present a definite problem. This allows a focus on the learning outcome.

Why should we be good? Theology Professor Tom Feiertag (Mequon) addresses this question in a presentation recorded earlier this year. From the presentation:

- ◆ Because of God's love for us, we respond by being good. How we respond is called our vocation.
